OPEN SPACE, RECREATION AND PATHWAYS PLAN 2020 UPDATE

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Town Board of the Town of Wilton, New York, County of Saratoga, will hold a public hearing for the Open Space, Recreation and Pathways Plan 2020 Update. Copies of the Plan are available for review by the public at the following locations during regular business hours: Town Clerk's Office, Town of Wilton, 22 Traver Road, Wilton, New York 12831 and www.townofwilton.com

SAID PUBLIC HEARING will be held on Thursday November 5, 2020 at 7:00 p.m., at the Gavin Park, Gavin Gymnasium located at 10 Lewis Drive, Saratoga Springs, New York 12866, at which time all persons will be given the opportunity to be heard.

Francis Moore, said he moved to the area from Tampa, Florida about seven years ago. One of the things they loved about the house was a beautiful, wooded area behind the house walking. In the winter, people were snowshoeing. He said he battled a sinkhole for several years and felt threatened in Tampa. He said now his beautiful home is now being threatened by development near Mulberry Estates. Land is being cleared for surveying and we are concerned about it. Ryan Riper, Director of Planning and Engineering said the land is privately owned and recently sold. There is also a National Grid Easement and a Saratoga County Waterline. Mr. Moore said they are proposing homes between the two easements and is concerned about that. Mr. Riper said the town has not received any formal plans for a subdivision. Mr. Moore asked what they should do as a group to stay informed. Mr. Riper said he should stay in touch with the agenda for the planning board. Councilman O'Connor said agendas are posted on the Town's website.

Toni Sturm, 41 Parkhurst Road said she commended the folks who put the plan together. She said she felt a little frustrated because she considers herself someone who has a deep interest in open space and wetlands preservation and had no idea any of this was going on. She respectfully submitted, going forward with the plan, there are two areas she felt very important and could be emphasized more. One would be the whole concept of connectivity and trail systems and focus a little bit more on bicycle access, especially given that Gavin Park is such a central child and family-oriented place for our community. There are a tremendous number of developments all around and there should be designated safe maintained access for children and families on bicycles and suggested creating a broad spoke of stakeholders from within the community to address this issue. The second area is the southern portion of the Palmertown

Range. We have a major stakeholder with Saratoga Plan as well as the Open Space Institute. She said she was unsure of how much the town coordinated with them with the update of the documents. They have a \$500,000 grant to develop trail systems across that range. It is a multitude of proposed uses from mountain biking to walking, hiking, potential snowmobiling, and horse trails. This might be another area we could broaden town input to get a large consensus of stakeholders so us folks in the community feel like we had some input as to how this all comes about. Councilman O'Connor said Larry Gordon used to be a member of the town board and was the Director of Planning for Saratoga County. He started working on this project a few years ago and sadly, Larry passed away. Some of us are trying to pick up where he left off. We have been in contact with Saratoga Plan. He said he, Ryan and Saratoga Plan swapped emails this week. When the document was first drafted, the Palmertown Range project wasn't as hot a topic as it is now. We are looking at, in concert with the plan, is beefing up that particular project in the document. Ms. Sturm said she encouraged the board to broaden their scope of stakeholders because there is a lot of energy, talent and resources in our community.

Wendy Mahaney, 74 Damascus Drive said she did not know about the revision until recently. Anyone in the community she has talked to did not know about this until recently. She said she did not live here in 2015 when most of the community outreach for community interest and engagement on this. She encouraged the board to do public presentations about the plan, have a comment period besides just the required one, including any follow-up emails from comment submissions. The town has an email system and said she receives emails once in great while. Sending out a document like this, asking for review and comments, would be a great use of that email system. Overall, the plan is great. There are a couple of things she said she would respectfully request. One is measurable recommendations and actions, putting things in there that you recommend that people can see how far we have come when you look back in five or ten years. Including that in the later sections as opposed to just the executive summary would be super helpful. She said she would like to see a greater discussion on the importance of open space in terms of the business and services that they provide, water purification and groundwater recharge, flood control, stormwater runoff, climate resilience and those types of services. In Section 3, it would be helpful to have a map that lays out more resolution as to the spaces that are left undeveloped and what their protected status is would be super helpful. We have a lot of children and families. She said she has two young girls, we love Gavin Park. Every time we go to Gavin Park, we get in the car because there is no safe way for my family and 100's of other families who live in the neighborhoods around here, to get to Gavin Park safely, without having to get in the car. Connectivity is extremely important. In new subdivisions, there are things included for future subdivisions that will help plan for those connections better. For those of us in existing neighborhoods, it is important to consider how we can access these trail systems as well.

The public hearing will remain open until December 3, 2020.

Honoring Veteran Joseph Burns

Supervisor Lant said Saratoga County Board of Supervisors has honored our deceased veterans for years. They now have begun honoring our living veterans. It is a great honor to honor Wilton town resident, Joe Burns. He said he's known Joe most of his life as well as his wife, his parents and his brothers, who also served in the military.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, America was founded on the principles of liberty, opportunity and justice for all, and we recognize the men and women of our Armed Forces who have valiantly defended these values throughout our Nation's history. These remarkable individuals have helped to make our Nation secure and to advance the cause of freedom worldwide. By answering the call of duty and risking their lives to protect their fellow countrymen, these patriots have inspired our Nation with their courage, compassion and dedication.

WHEREAS, **Joseph P. Burns** was born on February 18, 1931 in West Hebron and has been a resident of the Town of Wilton since he was two years old, and

WHEREAS, **Joseph P. Burns** worked as a landscaper for Bentley Florist, and

WHEREAS, **Joseph P. Burns** enlisted in the United States Army on January 10, 1951. After Basic Training he was stationed at Ft. Sam Houston, Texas where he became

certified as an Operating Room Technician,
and

WHEREAS, **Joseph P. Burns** was subsequently assigned to Augsburg, Germany where he served with the Medical Company 109th Infantry Regiment, 28th Infantry Division. **Joseph** was then assigned to the 2nd Battalion and transferred to Leipheim, Germany, and

WHEREAS, **Joseph P. Burns** served our country honorably and was awarded the Army Occupation Medal – Germany and was honorably discharged on December 11, 1953 reaching the rank of Staff Sergeant, and

WHEREAS, **Joseph P. Burns** served our community as a member of the Wilton Volunteer Fire Department and as a member of the American Legion and VFW, and

WHEREAS, **Joseph P. Burns** married his wife Marguerite in 1972 and had three children, and

WHEREAS, through the years, our veterans have returned home from their duties to become active and responsible citizens in their communities, further contributing to the growth and development of our Nation. **Joseph P. Burns** was active in the community working at the Mt. McGregor Veteran's Camp caring for the injured veterans and he later worked as a truck driver employed by the Town of Wilton Highway Department until his retirement in 1994, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Wilton honors **Joseph P. Burns** for his activities as a veteran and an outstanding member of the community, now thereof be it

PROCLAIMED, that the 5th day of November 2020 is hereby dedicated to **Joseph P. Burns** in grateful recognition on behalf of all the citizens of the Town of Wilton.

Supervisor Lant presented another proclamation from the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors and thanked Mr. Burns for his military service, sacrifices, what he did for his fellow man and the great things he did for the Town of Wilton.

Frank McClements, Saratoga County Veteran's Administrator thanked the Town of Wilton for having him here. He said we have our deceased veteran's program and has had to postpone it due to COVID-19. Supervisor Lant took us up on the offer to honor living veterans. Mr. McClements said he presided over the ceremony for Mr. Burns' brothers in 2014. He said he remembered the connection between the Burns family and his own family. He said his mother was one of fourteen children and of her eight brothers, six served in the United States Military. They were Viet Nam vets. One of Mr. Burns' brothers was a Viet Nam vet and World War II, Korean War and Joe was the Occupation Forces in Germany. The 109th Infantry Regiment, when the Germans surrendered in WWII, immediately, the Soviet Union started staking territory as it was the very beginning of the Cold War and then, Korea happened. The 109th was originally a National Guard Unit out of Pennsylvania just before Joe joined them. They were deployed to Germany. Their mission was to be there in case the Soviets decided to push across the Iron Curtain. A very interesting time period to be there and Joe probably has a tremendous number of stories. He said Joe came home after serving in the medical detachment caring for his fellow soldiers and continued to do it back at home at the veteran's hospital at Mount McGregor. Mr. McClements said he had a couple of things he would like to share to Joe and his family. The first is the Saratoga County Service Medal. The main reason this unit was activated was because we were at war in Korea. It is often known as the forgotten war. The medal was presented to Mr. Burns. Mr. McClements Last year the Board of Supervisors commissioned coins for veteran's services and a coin was also presented to Mr. Burns. Mr. McClements said he and Supervisor Lant came up with something after doing research on Mr. Burns unit. There was a yearbook posting on Facebook for a 1953 for the 28th Infantry and as the pictures were flipped through on line, he said he discovered in the Infantry Regiment, Medical Company was a very good looking young man, Joseph P. Burns, in uniform with his company. Supervisor Lant purchased the book of Mr. Burns behalf. Mr. McClements said it is always nice to honor a veteran. Since it is November, he said he asked Supervisor Lant if he could present a coin to any veterans present. Chris Mergman of the United States Navy was presented a coin. Mr. McClements thanked everyone for coming. Supervisor Lant thanked Mr. Burns for his service.

Open Space, Recreation and Pathways Update 2020

Councilman O’Conor thanked everyone for their comments for the revision of the plan. He said the town has been talking with Saratoga Plan and received feedback earlier this week. Margo Olson has also been talking to him and emailed changes as well. Councilman O’Conor said he is a biker and going back to the original town masterplan in the late 1980, he was the chair of the committee. We had a preliminary design for bikeways around town. Fifteen to twenty years after that, there was another effort made to connect the residential subdivisions and the opposition to the bikeway was 10-fold to the number of people who supported it. Mr. Ripper asked if it was the Carr Road plan. Councilman O’Conor said it was when Kate Maynard was our town planner. It is something we should look at. We are not going to take any action on the plan this evening. The purpose was to get input with the other input we have already received from Wilton Wildlife and Saratoga Plan. We will be doing some additional revisions and maybe a restructuring as to how the plan is laid out. If there is anyone who want very specific language, please contact me directly. Supervisor Lant said Mr. Ripper and Councilman O’Conor are working with everyone to update the plan.

2021 Preliminary Budget

Supervisor Lant said the public hearing was held on the 2021 Preliminary Budget and for the 39th year, there are no town taxes. The 2021 budget has been reduced by \$470,000 over the 2020 budget. He thanked Maria Maron, Comptroller for an excellent job as well as all of the department heads and staff. We have lost a lot of sales tax revenue with COVID-19 and department heads sharpened their pencils and budgeted for needs only. Ms. Moran thanked the department heads for a great job when submitting the budget. We look forward to a good year even though our revenue was down and even with that, we were able to have a balanced budget. He asked if there were any requests for changes. There were none.

On a motion introduced by Councilman O’Conor, the board adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION #192

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, to approve the adoption of the 2021 preliminary budget as the final budget.

The adoption of the resolution was seconded by Councilwoman Kolligian, duly put to a vote, all in favor. The motion passed 4-0.

Deputy Supervisor McEachron arrived at 7:30 p.m.

Road Dedication-Market Place Road

On a motion introduced by Deputy Supervisor McEachron, the board adopted the following resolution:

Polling Location for Districts 1,6 and 9 for 2021

The Town Clerk noted the polling location for Districts 1,6 and 9 were moved to the Senior Center due to construction on the court building. We can change it back to the court or consolidate the districts at Gavin Park. Councilman O'Connor asked if there was any negative feedback on the consolidation this year. Ms. Baldwin said, other than the custodial staff, no. The Board of Elections favored a consolidated polling district. It could be left at the Senior Center, moved back to the Court or consolidated at Gavin Park. Councilman Bogardus said he would like it to stay out of the Court building.

On a motion introduced by Councilman Bogardus, the board adopted the following resolution:

ESTABLISHMENT OF**

TOWN OF WILTON WATER DISTRICT NO. 1

ALONG DAVIDSON DRIVE

WHEREAS, residents of the southern portion of Davidson Drive have expressed interest in the establishment of a Town Water District to replace shallow wells which typically produce inadequate quality or quantity of water and to enhance fire protection in the area; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board is considering establishing Water District No. 1 (the “District”) in this area in accordance with New York Town Law Article 12-A; and

WHEREAS, the Wilton Water and Sewer Authority (WWSA) engaged Environmental Design Partnership, LLP (EDP) to prepare a Map, Plan and Report (“Report”) concerning the proposed Water District; and

WHEREAS, the Report was filed in the Town Clerk’s Office and made available for public inspection; and

WHEREAS, the Report delineates the boundaries of the proposed water district, a general plan of the proposed system, a report of the proposed method of operation, the source of water supply and improvements; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board was Lead Agency for purposes of the mode of constructing the proposed water district environmental review required for the project under the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), determined that establishment of the District will not result in any large or important impacts and, therefore, is one which will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment and authorized the filing of the completed EAF as its SEQRA Negative Declaration for establishment of the District; and

WHEREAS, the estimated annual cost to the “typical property” was filed with the Town Clerk and is made a part of the Map, Plan and Report; and

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2020, subsequent to the filing of the Map, Plan and Report with the Town Clerk, the Town Board adopted the Public Hearing Order reciting (a) the boundaries of the proposed District; (b) the proposed improvements; (c) the maximum amount proposed to be expended for the District; (d) the estimated cost of hook-up fees (if any) and the cost of the proposed District to the typical property and the typical one or two family home (if not the typical property); (e) that no Town financing is to be employed; (f) the fact that a Map, Plan and Report describing the proposed District is on file in the Town Clerk’s Office;

and (g) the time and place of a Public Hearing on the proposed Water District; and

WHEREAS, copies of the Public Hearing Order were duly published and posted and were filed with the Office of the State Comptroller, all as required by law; and

WHEREAS, prior to publication of the Public Hearing Order, a detailed explanation of how the estimated cost of hook-up fees (if any) and the cost of the proposed Water District to the typical property and typical one or two family home (if not the typical property) were computed was filed with the Town Clerk for public inspection; and

WHEREAS, a Public Hearing on the proposed Water District was duly held on August 6, 2020 and the Town Board has considered the evidence given together with other information, and

WHEREAS, on October 1, 2020 the Town Board adopted a Resolution determining that (a) the Order scheduling the Public Hearing was published and posted as required by law and was otherwise sufficient, (b) all property and property owners within the proposed Water District are benefited thereby, (c) all property and property owners benefited are included within the limits of the proposed Water District and (d) it is in the public interest to establish, authorize, and approve the proposed Water District as described in the Map, Plan and Report on file with the Town Clerk with the boundaries and benefited areas of the proposed Water District to be as shown on the map of the proposed Water District attached as Exhibit A to the Map, Plan and Report, subject to permissive

referendum in the manner provided in Town Law Article 7 and subject to certain conditions specified in the Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Town Clerk duly posted and published the notice required for resolutions subject to permissive referendum and no petition for referendum was filed within 30 days after the date of the Resolution, and the Town Clerk has caused a certificate to that effect to be filed in the office of the County Clerk; and

WHEREAS, the permission of the State Comptroller is not required pursuant to Town Law Section 209-f; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board wishes to establish the proposed District as detailed in the Map, Plan and Report in accordance with Town Law Article 12-A;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY

ORDERED, that the Town of Wilton Water District No. 1 be established as described in the Map, Plan and Report and the improvements described in the Map, Plan and Report be constructed and the service within the District be provided upon the required funds being made available or provided for; and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that the Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause a certified copy of this Order to be duly recorded in the office of the County Clerk and to be filed in the office of the State Department of Audit and Control in the time and manner required by law; and it is

FURTHER ORDERED, that the Town Board authorizes and directs the Town

Supervisor, Town Clerk and Town Counsel to take all other actions necessary to effectuate the terms of this Resolution.

The adoption of the resolution was seconded by Councilwoman Kolligian, duly put to a vote, all in favor. The motion passed 5-0.
